Chair's Corner

We are just 28 days away from our annual Democratic Party gettogether. Although the name has changed from the Jefferson-Jackson Dinner to the Frederick Democratic Gala, the evening remains our signature event and promises to be better than ever this year. The theme for the 2017 gala is "Celebrating our Heritage, Cultivating our Future," and we are delighted that our special guest for the evening will be the senior senator from the state of Minnesota – Amy Klobuchar.

Senator Klobuchar is one of only 21 women serving in the United States Senate. She is also one of the most effective and is considered a rising star in the Democratic Party. In 2016, she ranked first among all 100 senators in sponsoring/cosponsoring bills that were enacted into law. The daughter of a newspaperman and a teacher, whose grandfather worked in the iron ore mines of northern Minnesota, she has built a reputation of putting partisanship aside to help strengthen the economy and support families, workers and businesses.

Senator Klobuchar led the effort to pass landmark pieces of legislation to end human trafficking and to combat the opioid epidemic, and she fought to pass the most significant consumer product safety legislation in a generation. She has been a leader in working to implement a competitive agenda to ensure businesses have the tools they need to grow and create good jobs in their communities and has passed a significant amendment aimed at boosting funds for STEM education.

Senator Klobuchar serves on a number of important senate committees including the Judiciary Committee, the, Commerce, Science and Transportation Committee, the Agriculture, Nutrition and Forestry Committee, and the Joint Economic Committee. She is the ranking member of the Senate Rules Committee, where she works to ensure fairness, transparency, and efficiency in government. We are honored that she will be joining us this year.

There is a great deal of interest in this year's gala; the missteps of the Donald Trump gang and his threat to our democracy have galvanized many Democrats. The upcoming Frederick municipal elections are also drawing attention. Our venue, Springfield Manor, can comfortably accommodate 250 people, and we

are already creeping up to that number. Don't be left out; go to our website

Senator Ron Young - District 3

There is a lot of discussion regarding the Frederick Hotel and Conference Center. Much of the information being circulated is not accurate.

During my tenure as mayor of the City of Frederick, the downtown was devastated by a massive flood in 1976. I worked with community groups to plan the recovery efforts, stabilize the Carroll Creek watershed and preserve the historic quality and economic viability of our downtown. These efforts evolved into the Carroll Creek Plan with multiple stages of development. Since the 1980s, including the current 2010 plan, the City of Frederick Strategic Plan has included hotels and a conference center along Carroll Creek.

The underlying goal of the plan has always been to preserve the uniqueness of downtown while fostering economic vitality and stability. It is the charm of Frederick that has attracted tens of thousands of new people and hundreds of new businesses, as well as hotel companies, making the hotel and conference center viable. There remains an economic advantage to ensuring that the downtown area remain focused on historic preservation, arts, small businesses, affordable development, and pedestrian thoroughfares. The Historic Preservation Commission will be integrally involved in the project's design to ensure its compatibility.

Thus, in one form or another, I have been working on the Carroll Creek Plan and revitalization of downtown Frederick for over 40 years. Concerns such as those being expressed about the hotel were also expressed about burying the telephone and electrical wires, building the parking garages, planting trees, the restoration of the Weinberg Center, and, in general, about any attempts to restore or revitalize downtown Frederick. The project I was fought hardest on is now the lead attraction to downtown Frederick - Carroll Creek. All of these projects have been successful, as the hotel and conference center will be. They and many other improvements have all been part of a master plan to make Frederick an economically vital and livable community.

What is here did not happen by accident. The hotel and conference center, along with many other planned improvements yet to come, are all part of the master plan to make Frederick one of the most livable communities anywhere.

As senator, I am answering the call of several generations of citizens as well as the City of Frederick aldermen and mayor, the Frederick County Council and Executive, and the Frederick Chamber of Commerce in bringing the final stages of the Carroll Creek development plan to life.

Dear Frederick County Democrats:

Springtime brings annual events that are uplifting to the community. Frederick County Tourism's event this year brought good news that tourists are spending over \$1 million a day in Frederick County. Tourism spending results in tax revenue that equals \$1000 per individual property tax bill; because of the tourism spending, we pay less property tax. The hotel tax revenue supports the award-winning Visitor's Center. The balance of hotel tax is distributed around the county enhancing community events and projects that promote tourism. Tourism is big business in Frederick County, creating jobs and business opportunities.

Downtown Frederick Partnership has a spring event to highlight their many activities throughout the year that draw visitors to the downtown. Frederick does a great job promoting community amenities as an enticement for people to visit and spend money. I hear regularly from other state elected officials that Frederick is a great place to visit.

Both the tourism board and Downtown Frederick Partnership support the Hotel and Conference Center. As a member of the House Appropriations Committee, I was able to work closely with House Speaker Michael Busch and committee leadership to ensure state funding for the project. Small business and major employers in Frederick County also support this project, which will promote growth and expansion in downtown including adding hundreds of jobs. The project will continue to optimize revenue generated from

visitors to the area and the positive impact that revenue has for our community.

Bike to Work Day brings out the biking community focusing attention on this clean and healthy mode of transportation. And, of course, Frederick has the best local Bike to Work Day in the region. Starting out as a small event over a decade ago, Bike to Work Day in Frederick has grown to hundreds of participants.

Many graduations are held in May. I attended FCC and Hood College Graduate programs this year. Graduations are especially uplifting because we see the culmination of years of students' work and dedication. All in attendance are happy - students, teachers, families and friends. And the speeches are inspiring and positive. The two FCC student speakers emphasized that their FCC education experience changed their lives and the encouragement of the faculty was most beneficial. These graduates are heading into the future well prepared for jobs in today's economy.

The daily reports from Washington leave many of us worried about the direction of our country. The President's budget proposal recently released is especially distressing because it drastically cuts social programs leaving many economically disadvantaged with no safety net. Our anxiety is very high. But sometimes we need to look to positive things in our community that show we are moving in a positive direction. The Rest of the Story

The other day, Brent Ayer dropped off at my office some old Democratic buttons, brochures and a copy of the Banner from 1993. It occurs to me that many current readers of the Banner do not know the history of this publication. In 1975, in my first term on the Central Committee, I made a motion that the Central Committee should establish a newsletter to better communicate with Democrats in Frederick County. As often happens, when someone makes a motion to do something, that someone is assigned the responsibility to do what the motion suggests. Hence, I became the first editor of the Banner and continued in that capacity until 1994. From 1975 to 1990, the Banner was mailed to individual subscribers for \$2.00 a year (I think it was \$2.00). Every month, starting with a dittoed one-page newsletter, I would draft and send out the Banner. Later, it was mimeographed. For those who have no idea what I am talking about, you will have to Google "ditto and mimeograph."

Often, my wife and three children would be commandeered to put on address labels, return addresses, postage stamps, and reminders to pay on the dittoed and mimeographed *Banners* as they went out to the mail. Later, starting around 1990, we had a printer print the *Banner* about six times a year. From 1994 to 1998, when part of the time Blaine Young was the Chair of the

Democratic Central Committee (can you believe that?) the *Banner* went dormant. In 1998, the *New Banner* was established, and Patty and Ron Wolf printed it monthly using new computer technology, but it was still mailed. Today we are blessed to have e-mail, and Mari Lee does an excellent job editing and producing the *Banner*.

Frederick County Democrats lost two wonderful, stalwart Democratic women recently. Catherine "Kitty" Smith and Earlene Thornton came from very different backgrounds and approached politics in their own unique ways, but they were both committed to the Democratic Party. Kitty came at politics from her agrarian background and was outspoken in her love for Frederick County. She was a strong proponent of farmers and the involvement of women in government. She faithfully served the Women's Democratic League and the Central Committee. Earlene came from a background in education and civil rights and was equally as committed as Kitty to the Democratic Party, the movement for equal rights and women's rights. Both were chosen by the Central Committee for the Woman of the Year award, and both will be missed.

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On May 1st, we had a split program. The first half was about healthcare and community activism with our guest, Beth Landry (community activist and local leader of HealthcareNow). There is a lot of waste in the current medical system and while he ACA is good, it does need improvement. Single payer (HR 676) will go a long way to giving more people coverage and would no longer require employers to pay into it. Please contact your local representatives to sign on to the bill. Our second guest was Antonio Bowens, candidate for Frederick City Alderman. He is a long time Frederick County resident and has always had interest politics. He strongly supports enforcement of blighted property ordinances and would like to see the city invest in solar energy. Antonio also supports the \$15 livable wage and publicly subsidized WiFi to make connectivity more attainable.

UDFC usually meets the first Monday of each month and gives Democrats an opportunity to discuss topics of interest to the membership and /or the community, as well as to organize to promote Democratic causes. Our next meeting will be Monday, June 5, 2017, with Jennifer Dougherty, candidate for Mayor, and Jeannette Bartelt, candidate for Frederick City Alderman. UDFC meets at Café 611, 611 North Market Street in Frederick. Doors open at 5:45 p.m. for dinner and socializing; meeting starts at 7:00 p.m.


